## Money-Saving Lawn & Landscaping Tips . the Scoop on Poop

We can't give you a money tree, but we can give you lawn and landscaping tips to save you both money—and time. This spring, when yard work beckons, consider these easy-toimplement practices:

### **Treat Your Soil Right**

Test your soil every 3-4 years to determine exactly what your lawn needs so you don't waste money overfeeding and damaging your yard. If your lawn does need fertilizer, make sure rain isn't in the two-day forecast, and keep the fertilizer off paved surfaces, driveways, sidewalks and roadways. #### Go Native with Your Plantings

Trees, shrubs and hardy perennials not only beautify your yard, they keep the soil in its place and slow down the flow of rain water so it soaks deep within the ground. When selecting new plantings, choose native varieties which require less or no watering and fertilizer. A bonus: These plants are more resistant to insects and diseases.

### Mulch, Mulch, Mulch

A two-inch layer of mulch material, such as fir bark, pine needles or wood chips, will control erosion, retain moisture, reduce water loss and stabilize the soil temperature. Mulch also can reduce or eliminate weeds, freeing you up to reach for your tennis racket instead of a rake.

#### Mow at the **Proper Height** Newly-seeded

lawns should be

mowed early and often, leaving 1.5 to 2 inches of grass height. Once your lawn is established, set the mower blade higher, leaving 2 to 3.5 inches of grass.

### Water Wisely

Water only when your lawn is stressed from lack of water. Then, water deeply, but infrequently, to encourage deep roots. Typically, a total of 1 inch of water a week is all you need.

## Take Back the Tap

We live in a world where over a billion people are without access to safe, clean drinking water and an estimated three million people die annually from preventable waterborne diseases. Yet, in Hampton Roads, we can drink from any public tap with the highest level of confidence, never having to think twice about the quality of the product that comes out of our taps.

When it comes to safety, tap water is the clear choice. The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) requires routine testing of tap water to ensure it is safe for everyone to drink. Here in Hampton Roads, our water has always met or exceeded EPA standards for safe drinking water. In many ways, EPA's standards for tap water are more stringent than the Food and Drug Administration's standards for bottled water. In fact, a third of all bottled water in the United States is actually just filtered tap water.

The oil and energy required for the production and distribution of bottled water is staggering. In the United States we buy more than two billion bottles of water each month, and less than 25 percent of those bottles actually get recycled. So why do we spend so much money on bottled water that costs thousands of times more than tap water? You can pay a dollar or more for a bottle of water, or for that same dollar, you could refill a sports bottle over 1,000 times.

It's time we take back the tap to protect our wallets, our health and our community. What can you do? Prevent pollution and decrease waste by choosing tap over bottled water. Grab a reusable bottle on your way out the door to reduce your reliance on bottled alternatives. And show your appreciation for the value and vital role of drinking water by supporting investment in public infrastructure so we can continue to enjoy clean, safe, affordable tap water for generations to come.

# Skip the **FOG Forecast** by Keeping Drains Fat Free

**FOG.** You probably think of this as a weather term, but FOG (fats, oils and grease) takes on a whole new meaning when it comes to what lies beneath our streets, lurks under manholes and clings to the insides of pipes that connect right to your very own kitchen sink. Sound like a horror film? It is scary when you consider that FOG contributes to more than half of all sanitary sewer blockages in Hampton Roads.

## Money-Saving Tip -

### There are plenty of ways to spend \$150. A visit from the plumber shouldn't be one of them.

To avoid sewage backups and unnecessary bills, keep the following oily, greasy foods out of your drain and garbage disposal:

- butter/margarine
- lards/shortening
- cake batter
- icing
- food scraps
- salad dressings
- sauces
- dairy products
   (yogurt, sour cream, cream cheese, etc.)

Poured or washed down the drain into the sanitary sewer system, FOG clings to pipe walls and builds up over time, blocking the flow of wastewater exiting a home's plumbing. This can lead to an overflow or backup of wastewater into our homes or onto our streets and down storm drains which lead straight to local waterways.

You might be surprised that the source of all this greasy buildup in our pipes is not just cooking oils or grease. You'll find it daily in your kitchen in the form of meats, butter, food scraps, dairy products, batters, dressings, sauces, and more. So, how do we fight the fat to protect pipes and prevent costly blockages and backups?

**1)** Skip the garbage disposal and always be mindful of what you wash down the drain.

**2)** Use a basket strainer to catch food particles and toss them in the trash or compost bin.

**3)** Scrape plates and wipe cookware with a paper towel prior to washing.

**4)** Never pour used cooking grease down the drain. Instead, pour it into an empty, heat-safe container, like a soup can, let it cool and harden, then toss it out with the garbage.

## Volunteers to Cleanup & Green Up Hampton Roads This Spring

From Poquoson to Portsmouth and Newport News to Norfolk, cleanup projects are planned throughout Hampton Roads this month and beyond when hundreds of volunteers mobilize as part of Keep America Beautiful's Great American

### Cleanup™ National Action Days, April 27-28.

Earlier this year, Keep America Beautiful selected Hampton Roads as one of 10 national sites to host these transformational community events the last weekend in April, with additional cleanup projects planned for the spring and summer. According to regional event partners **askHRgreen.org** and Keep Virginia Beautiful, these "cleanup and green up" projects will have long-lasting benefits for Southeastern Virginia communities, thanks to the volunteers.

"Last year, Great American Cleanup volunteers nationwide removed 177 million pounds of litter and debris from parks, public lands, wetlands and trails, and they collected more than 215.2 million plastic bottles for recycling. In addition they spruced up playgrounds, remediated illegal dump sites and planted 166,000 trees, among many other accomplishments," said Regional Project Chairman John Deuel. "This speaks so well of America's commitment to volunteerism, and I know that Hampton Roads residents are ready to step up and make a difference here at home." Deuel is counting on having at least 1,500 volunteers participate in more than 60 organized Great American Cleanup projects in Hampton Roads. Working with local municipalities in most of the 16 cities and counties, **askHRgreen.org** leaders helped to coordinate a wide variety of half-day projects from which volunteers could choose.

Norfolk, Portsmouth and Virginia Beach are coordinating citywide cleanups of neighborhoods, parks and recreation areas. Chesapeake has planned a gateway beautification project at Bainbridge Boulevard. Suffolk volunteers will pick up litter along Shingle Creek, and Smithfield is planning an Earth Day cleanup at Windsor Castle Park.

A few miles away, Hampton volunteers will convene for an "Interchange Change," picking up litter along the intersection of LaSalle Avenue and Mercury Boulevard. James City County will host a shoreline beautification project at the Chickahominy Riverfront Park, while York County will host a "Keep York County Beautiful Day." In Poquoson, plans are in place for a cleanup along the city's "blueway trail" between Messick Point and Amory Wharf that will require the aide of local fishermen.

"We'll be cleaning up both the shoreline and the waterway," said Evie Insley, who serves as administrative support technician for the city of Poquoson. "We thought if we had shallow draw boats on the water, it would work. We're also

asking volunteers to wear their 'bubba boots' for cleaning up debris along the shoreline."

Recycling events are in the mix too, with electronics and household hazardous waste collections in Newport

News and a reusable bag exchange and plastic bag recycling event in Isle of Wight County. Both collections will take place April 27.

Not only is the Great American Cleanup drawing scores of individual volunteers, the event has sparked the interest of local busi-



nesses and military commands—including hundreds of sailors from the U.S.S. Harry S. Truman.

Giving back to one's community by cleaning up the environment is something that Deuel hopes everyone will do.

"It's a great way for people to see their neighbors, meet new friends and see how we're all connected to the region," Deuel said. "And, it's a lot of fun." Check

## What to Recycle

Last year, national Great American Cleanup volunteers collected and recycled more than 215.2 million plastic bottles, 7.9 million pounds of electronics and over 12.1 million pounds of glass. Recycling at home is one of the easiest things you can do to keep such debris off of our greenscapes—and out of the landfill. Here's a snapshot of items that can be tossed in your recycling bin or taken to a nearby recycling center—and those that cannot.



- Cardboard (flattened)
- Mixed paper (office paper, junk mail, cereal boxes, phone books, etc.)
- Plastic bottles with #1 or #2 on the bottom (one-gallon milk jugs, juice bottles, soda bottles, laundry detergent bottles, peanut butter containers, and salad dressing and vegetable oil containers)
- Glass bottles (all colors are accepted)
- Steel, tin and aluminum cans
